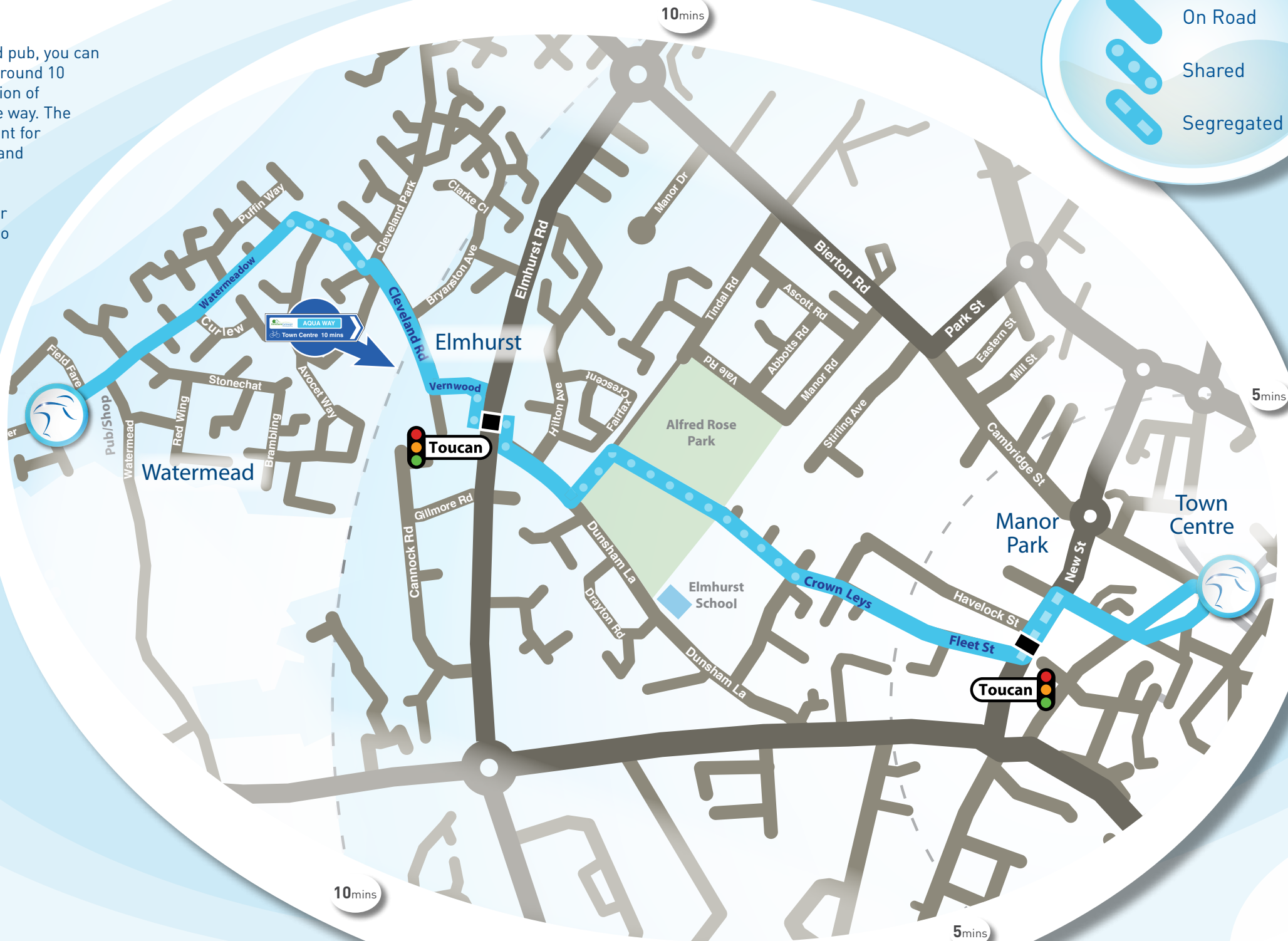


Starting at the Watermead pub, you can reach the town centre in around 10 minutes using a combination of off-road and on-road cycle way. The Aqua Way is also convenient for people living in Elmhurst and Manor Park.

The Aqua Way is one of our most pleasant cycleways to travel along, in particular when cycling through Alfred Rose Park. As well as providing direct access to the town centre, it also provides an excellent opportunity for parents to cycle their children to Elmhurst Infant and Junior schools.

**Cycle Aylesbury have made a number of improvements to the continuity and profile of the Gemstone cycle network.**

Red surfacing has been applied across roads to show the continuation of the cycle ways. Red surfacing lets drivers see cyclists and pedestrians approaching. It is hoped that motorists will be more considerate and allow them to cross when they are waiting. The red surfacing does not provide increased priority for cyclists but it does show that a crossing is approaching. The 'SLOW' markings and Give Way triangles on the cycle ways make it clear to cyclists that they are approaching a crossing and that they will need to take care as they cross the road.

Aylesbury is one of the original 6 national Cycling Towns working towards the Cycling England vision of 'more people cycling, more safely, more often.'

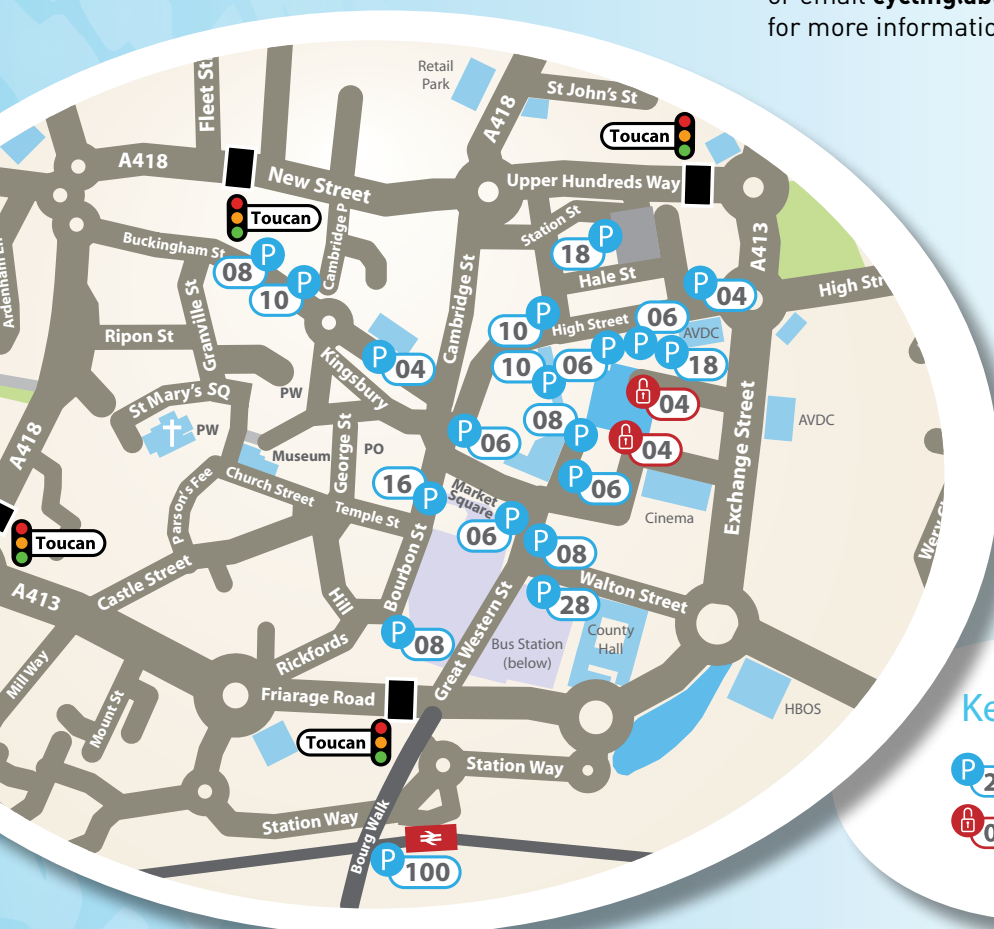

## Junctions & Crossings

### Raised Crossing

Provide a level crossing point. Red surfacing shows that cyclists will be crossing but does not give extra priority for cyclists.

### Toucan Crossing

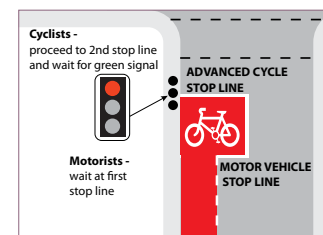
Pedestrians and cyclists share a signalled crossing area. Cyclists do not need to dismount.

### Cyclists using Pedestrian Crossings

Cyclists may use other crossings to cross the road, e.g. pelican and zebra, but should always dismount.

### Advanced Stop Lines

A number of traffic signal controlled junctions in the town have advanced stop lines for cyclists. They enable cyclists to get to the front of traffic queues and improve safety, particularly when turning.



## Cycling Tips

Cycling in Aylesbury is easier than ever with on-road cycle lanes and off-road cycle paths. Here are some tips to ensure your journeys are safe and enjoyable.

- Wear a helmet (with a British Standard) - ensure it is a good fit.
- Use lights at night - front and rear.
- Know your route. Avoid difficult situations, such as right turns on busy roads. Choose cycle paths or advisory routes where possible.
- Wear reflective or fluorescent clothing for extra visibility
- Use a good lock (as a guide, a lock should cost about 7-10 % of the value of your bicycle).
- For added security, make sure your bike is easily identifiable. Make a note of the frame number, model, colour and accessories - take a photograph.
- Keep your bike well serviced, check brakes, steering and tyres regularly.
- Ensure children are well trained; if you are an adult set a good example.

## Pavement Rules

- On shared routes pedestrians may not be aware of your approach so be courteous, slow down, ring your bell and give them plenty of space. They may be hard of hearing or have bad eyesight.
- It is illegal to cycle on the footway unless it is specifically marked for cyclists.
- Cyclists should give way to pedestrians on shared paths.
